The ever topical debate on the *Homo neanderthalensis* - *Homo sapiens* substitution in Eurasia and in the Near East during the isotopic stage 3 and on the Middle – Early Upper Paleolithic shift also involves the area of the Mediterranean rim including Italy, a country in which research has produced in recent times new data on the chronology, ecological contexts and cognitive development of these human species.

An opportunity to discuss these arguments will be provided by a dedicated session promoted by the **Italian Anthropology Association** and the **Italian Quaternary Association**, in the frame of the XVIII Congress of the Italian Anthropology Association which will be held in Florence from 2nd to 4th October 2009.

The listed below oral and poster contributions will provide a synthethic view of the current available information about the geography of the Alpine Chain and the Thyrrenian and Adriatic shore-lines and about the past ecological conditions and their modifications in function of climatic variability and of vulcanic catastrophic events. Other improvements concern radiocarbon dating and its successfully experienced application in solving incertitudes using new treatment techniques on samples collected from finely stratified archaeological sequences.

The second part of the session will be dedicated to Neanderthals and Anatomically Modern Humans with special focus on the Uluzzian and its behavioural innovations compared to the Mousterian period readable in flint knapping and the appearance of new types of lithic and bone tools and ornaments before the abrupt change occurred with the spread of the Aurignacian.

The session will be held on Sunday, 4th October 2009, from 9.00 to 13.00, before the congress closing ceremony.
